

## Student Entitlement to careers education, information, advice and guidance (CEIAG) at OFA

CEIAG is about helping students to plan for their future by equipping them with the knowledge, skills and attitudes to make informed decisions about the choices open to them and to make successful transition through learning and into work.

The main themes are -

Developing through careers, employability and enterprise education; helping you to understand yourself and the influences on you.

Learning about careers and the world of work; supporting you to research careers information and understand the opportunities and options facing you.

Developing career management, employability and enterprise skills: helping you to make realistic plans about your next steps and to manage this positively including use of social media and their digital profile.

Your CEIAG includes a range of:

- Planned programme of career education from Year 7 onwards, delivered as part of a timetabled PSHE lesson
- Access to a qualified independent impartial Careers Adviser from year 8 including at least one interview by the end of Y11 if requested.
- Work experience in Year 10 and Y12
- Access to up to date and impartial careers information from a range of sources including information about learning pathways from 14
- Collapsed timetable events to find out about their work form a range of local employers
- Encounters with local employers you should be offered at least one encounter each year from year 7 to year 13. Examples of employer encounters are mentoring, job shadowing, delivering presentations with time for Q&A, mock interviews and workplace visits.
- Information about and/or visits to further education colleges, universities and other training providers, so you can understand the full range of courses, apprenticeships and technical education/training routes available.

Year 11 Students will participate in a planned programme of PSHE for an hour timetabled lesson each week to help them to:

<ul> <li>Know how to identify any barriers to their future plans</li> <li>Know what career planning involves</li> </ul>
• Learn how to complete job applications and know how to prepare for interviews and learn how their use of social media and their digital footprint can have potentially both a positive and negative impact on their employability
<ul> <li>Learn about the any financial support available</li> <li>Have a range of interactions with employers, in school including at least once in a workplace</li> </ul>

Post-16 Students will participate in a planned programme of tutorial activities and have one timetabled lesson a week to support with UCAS/Apprenticeship/Employment applications to support their future plans and enable them to:
<ul> <li>Manage their career development including taking part in work experience</li> <li>Understand and investigate the full range of the employment and educational pathways open to them post-18, including higher and degree apprenticeships as part of HE and Employment week</li> <li>Understand the support networks available to them to help them succeed</li> <li>Have a range of interactions with employers, in school including at least once in a workplace</li> </ul>
